Margaret's greatest love was pottery. Upon retiring to South Ponte Vedra beach, she threw pottery in her oceanside home studio, Luv Mud Studio, well into her 90's. Margaret loved red stone clay but also retrieved some very special clay wherever she could find it even hand digging a bit from a cliff. Her signature themes were derived from her love of the beach and ocean. Margaret's love of the beach started in childhood at her grandmother and grandfather's "shore place" on the Magothy River, in Maryland. That love of the beach continued when she was a "house Mother" during her many summers spent in Ocean City, Maryland.

Maug, as her family called her, was a beautiful, vibrant woman devoted to her family and friends. All who knew her will miss her, cherish her memory, and impact on their lives.
