Please know, you’ll always be family to us.

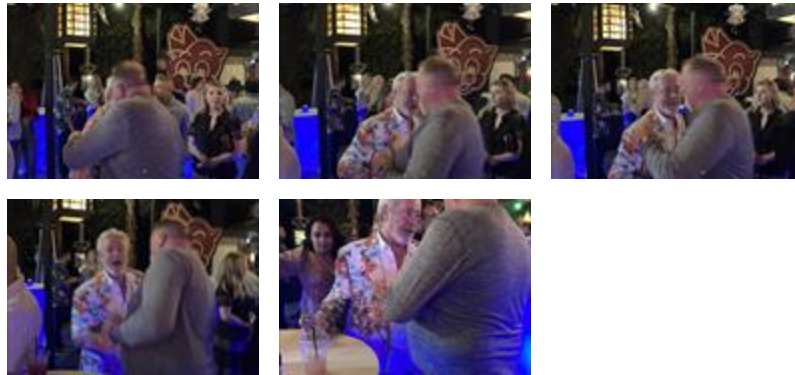
