



Rita Elizabeth Hofmann

November 3, 1926 - September 23, 2024

Rita Elizabeth Hofmann went to her reward on Sept 23, 2024 at 97 years of age. Second generation from Ireland, she was born in Cambridge, Massachusetts, on November 3, 1926. Her parents were Arthur Chapin Brownlee and Helen Mackin Brownlee.

She was married to Andrew Philip Hofmann from 1951 until he passed in 1997. She grew up in Westfield, New Jersey, attended Holy Trinity High School, trained to be an RN with the 'good nuns' at All Souls Hospital in Morristown NJ, received a Bachelors at Trenton State, and practiced nursing at Cornell, Mass Eye and Ear, NJ Commission for the Blind, Carrier Clinic Psychiatric Hospital and School Nurse at Immaculata High School, Somerville NJ.

With a move to Ocala in 1970, she received her Master's Degree in Nursing from USF and Masters in Education from University of Florida. Higher education was a major goal in her life and her final career was teaching nursing at Central Florida State College in Ocala for 30 years. She was a Board Member and instrumental in the founding of hospice in Ocala and a Board Member of Marion-Citrus Mental Health Center.

During World War II, she was stationed as an army nurse at the Hines Veterans Hospital in Chicago, Illinois, where she took care of the paralyzed veterans coming back from the war. As she recalled that time was one of the happiest years of her life. Her last volunteer work was with Hospice in Saint Augustine. She was a Hospice volunteer well into her 90's and was

instrumental in the founding of the Bailey Center where she passed away as one of her final wishes.

She is survived by her daughter, Mary Lou Hofmann, her son Andrew Patrick Hofmann, (Bebe) four grandchildren Chase Hofmann, Chandler Hofmann, Ben Sitten and Becca Sitten Parsons and two great grandchildren, Nora Jane and Elena Grace who was born 2 weeks before she passed....two souls passing.

Nana was a strong, high-spirited force of nature whose main focus in life was to help others and she did.

She will be interred with her husband Andrew, an Army Air Corps Veteran at the National Cemetery in Bushnell. Please continue to make contributions to your favorite charities.
